

Dear Friends of The Antioch Partners (TAP),

TAP is fully committed to the missional church paradigm. Our God is a missionary God, and we, his people, are a missionary people. As Michael Frost and Alan Hirsch write, "God is a sending God, with a desire to see humankind and creation reconciled, redeemed and healed. The missional church, then, is a sent church. I want to introduce you to one of these families, the Dunn Family, who I mentioned in our December 2008 TAP Update. Tim and Debbie Dunn are preparing to serve in leadership development through TAP in Brazil. TAP is partnering with a Brazilian mission agency, SEPAL (**S**erving **P**astors **A**nd **L**eaders), in supporting the Dunns in their ministry. SEPAL is committed to

leadership development, as well as to sending 200 new Brazilian missionaries throughout the world by 2015.

Tim recently retired from Delta Air Lines after a 22 year career. He has long been committed to God's mission in the world, and he developed a passion for the Brazilian people through Debbie, the daughter of PCUSA missionaries. After being ordained as a PCUSA Minister in 2007, Tim was called as the part-time Associate Minister of Multicultural Ministries at Ray-Thomas Memorial Presbyterian Church in Marietta, Georgia. Tim is continuing his education through the Doctor of Missiology program at Fuller Theological Seminary. His desire is to be used by God to help the Brazilian Church grow through evangelism, discipleship, leadership development, church planting and mission mobilization. Debbie is a career music educator who has taught choral and general music in public and private schools at elementary and high schools. She has also served in a number of churches where she has led children's and youth choirs. Debbie's desire is to help children praise God. As SEPAL works to increase the number of Brazilians serving cross-culturally and strengthen the leadership development and care, not only of these missionaries, but for Christian leaders throughout Brazil, the Dunns will be contributing in significant ways.
